





A SERMON SERIES ON THE BOOK OF REVELATION Here is what you need to know. The author: Four times the author identifies himself as John. Justin Martyr in the second century suggested it was John the Apostle; most scholars today do not believe this to be the case. All we know is that the author was a Jewish person who knew the Hebrew Scriptures and was most likely a leader for the seven churches in Asia Minor. Date most scholars estimate the book was written around 95. Reason for writing

Since Roman authorities at this time were beginning to enforce emperor worship, Christians were facing increasing hostility. The author is writing to encourage persecuted Christians. <u>Literary Form</u> Revelation is apocalyptic; a kind of writing that is highly symbolic. A distinctive feature is the frequent use of the number seven (52 times). There are seven beatitudes, seven churches, seven spirits, seven golden lamp stands, seven stars, seven seals, seven horns and seven eyes, seven trumpets, seven thunders, seven signs, seven crowns, seven plagues, seven golden bowls, seven hills and seven kings, as well as other sevens. Symbolically, the number seven stands for completeness. <u>Interpretations</u> of Revelation normally fall into four groups: *Preterists* understand the book exclusively in terms of its first-century setting, claiming that most of its events have already taken place. *Historicists* take it as describing the long chain of events from Patmos to the end of history. *Futurists* place the book primarily in the end times. *Idealists* view it as symbolic pictures of such timeless truths as the victory of good over evil.

In *Holy Envy*, Taylor contemplates myriad ways other people and traditions encounter the Transcendent, both by digging deeper into those traditions herself and by seeing them through her students' eyes as she sets off with them on field trips to monasteries, temples, and mosques.
